The Future of Transport

Friday, 16 April 2010, 9am – 12 noon The Waiau Room, Environment Canterbury, Kilmore St, Christchurch

Speakers: Steve Abley / Robert Woods / Simon Kingham

The aim of these Forums is firstly to give the speakers the opportunity to outline their understanding of the topic, and secondly, and perhaps more importantly, to provide the background information to resource what is hoped – and expected to be - a stimulating and forthright discussion.

Steve Abley is the Managing Director of Abley Transportation Consultants. Abley Transportation Consultants is based in Christchurch and employs eight professional who provide advice to central, regional and local government as well as private developers and not for profit groups. Steve is a Chartered Professional Engineer and is a past recipient of the Hume Fellowship, a Commonwealth Study Conferences alumni and Transit New Zealand (now the New Zealand Transport Agency) scholar. He has a very keen interest in sustainable transport and in 2004 co-authored Designing Living Streets. Designing Living Streets is a manual for the creation of better walking environments and was launched at the House of Commons in London. Steve is a graduate of the University of Canterbury.

Robert Woods is Programme Manager Transport at Canterbury Regional Council. His team is responsible for the strategic planning framework that guides regional land transport development in Canterbury, as well as being the lead planning agency for public passenger transport across the region. He moved into regional government planning in New Zealand following stints in civil engineering construction across the UK and South Africa, followed by sustainable transport roles at Transport for London and then from 2003 at Christchurch City Council, where he initiated the current bus priority programme and the development of the new Central City Transport Interchange. He currently Chairs the Canterbury Regional Land Transport Officers Group and the Urban Development Strategy Transportation Group.

Dr Simon Kingham is an Associate Professor in the Department of Geography at the University of Canterbury, in Christchurch, New Zealand. He has researched transport issues widely including significant projects in the field of transport, environment and health. He has published widely both reports and in peer reviewed journals. He is a member of the Canterbury Regional Transport Committee and the Greater Christchurch Urban Development Strategy Stakeholders Forum. He has a BA (hons) and a PhD in Geography. He is also passionate advocate for active and public transport.

Sustainability Forums
