Wayne Walker, Auckland Councillor, Chair Environment and Sustainability Forum.

The new Auckland Council presents the opportunity for a comprehensive approach on making Auckland more sustainable. Wayne is Auckland Council's environmental champion, leading initiatives to reduce waste and divert resources into recycling/reuse/energy production, conserve water and energy, reduce sedimentation, improve air quality, reduce carbon emissions, environmental education programmes and Auckland's sustainability generally. The Auckland Plan (spacial), Long Term Plan (10 year budget), Waste Plan, and Unitary Plan (RMA) are important engagement opportunities currently underway. He will make the case for getting involved.

She recently graduated with a PhD in Planning from The University of Auckland with the focus on her research being on the processes of institutional change required to transition to sustainable development. Through her work in the planning field over the past 15 years or so, Viv has become committed to the idea that we can and must change much of how we do things now in order to deliver on the promise and potential of sustainable development.

# Centres - why and how are they vital to a sustainable city

22,000 people now live in the CBD, but Auckland's Growth Strategy has been less successful in promoting the intensification of other centres to achieve a sustainable urban structure with efficient travel patterns and more lifestyle choice. The capacity is theoretically there, so how can we make it easier to:

- · Generate attractive, high-value building forms
- Persuade developers that they can make it stack up
- Create people places, rather than buildings amongst carparks
- Protect centres from out-of-centre retailing and office parks?

John joined Boffa Miskell four years ago after 30 years working in Auckland, London, Wellington and Christchurch - mainly in the public sector.

His work has ranged from designing and directing streetscape and town centre plans to strategic planning and District Plan development. He directed Waitakere City's Growth and Transport Integration Programme, which successfully carried through regional and district plan changes to achieve high-quality intensification around rail-based town centres and to create an intensive new 500ha growth corridor alongside the new motorway linking to the North Shore.

Since joining Boffa Miskell John has managed projects ranging from waterfront design to masterplanning and growth strategies. He was commissioned by the ARC as a "critical friend" to assist with the review of the Regional Growth Strategy and Regional Land Transport Strategy
